EHPS COVID-19 SCREENING PROTOCOLS

Self-Screening: Students, staff and visitors are expected to self-screen prior to attending/visiting school each day by checking to ensure that temperatures are below 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit and to observe for symptoms consistent with COVID-19 (Fever or chills, Cough, Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, Fatigue, Muscle or body aches, Headache, New loss of taste or smell, Sore throat, Congestion or runny nose, Nausea or vomiting, Diarrhea). Students, staff and visitors are asked to remain home if they are feeling sick, have any symptoms associated with COVID-19, or have had close contact with a person diagnosed with COVID-19. Parents/Guardian's/Staff should contact the School Nurse and report the absence/reason for absence to the School Nurse.

Entry/Daily Screening: School staff will visually screen students, staff and visitors as they enter the school as well as throughout the day, consistent with the state and local health guidance. This screen will consist of vigilant observation, watching for signs of fever, cough or respiratory distress. Students, staff and visitors may be asked about COVID-19 symptoms within the last 72 hours and whether anyone in their home has had COVID-19 symptoms or a positive test. If a student, staff or visitor is observed to have the previously described symptoms, they must be directed to the School Nurse immediately. Please note that temperature checks for students, staff or visitors at the point of entry will not be included based on the high likelihood of potential false positive and false negative results.

Enhanced Screening: If a student, staff or visitor demonstrates COVID-19 symptoms, they will be directed to the School Nurse for enhanced screening. At this point, the School Nurse will conduct a temperature check using a non-touch thermometer. Caution will be taken by the School Nurse including wearing gloves, eye protection, and a mask. Students, staff or visitors with a temperature greater than 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit will not be permitted in the school. At this point, staff and visitors will be sent home and students will be required to be admitted to the School Isolation Room to wait for a parent pick up.

Monitoring/Recording Health Data: For all enhanced screens conducted, the School Nurse will monitor and record screening information/data of students while complying with relevant health laws. The School Nurse will monitor symptoms in students and staff that could be related to COVID-19, with the goal of decreasing the risk of spreading or contracting the virus while complying with relevant health and privacy laws. Appropriate data should be communicated to the EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison.

EHPS COVID-19 RESPONSE FOR SYMPTOMATIC STUDENT, STAFF AND VISITOR PROTOCOLS

- Students, staff and visitors exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms (fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea) will be directed to report to the School Nurse for an Enhanced Screening process.
- 2. If the Enhanced Screening indicates a high probability of COVID-19 (ex. Temperature of over 100.4 Fahrenheit) students, will be directed to continue to wear a mask and wait in a supervised, Isolation Room through which others do not enter until the student can be transported home. If more than one student in the isolation area, physical social distancing will be maintained.

If the Enhanced Screening indicates a high probability of COVID-19 (ex. Temperature of over 100.4 Fahrenheit), staff and visitors will be directed to leave the building immediately.

- 3. The School Nurse will have a plan for triaging students in the Health Office/Isolation Room, recognizing that not all symptoms are COVID-19 related. The School Nurse will advise parents of sick students that students are not to return until they have met CDC criteria to discontinue home isolation. Students with temperatures of over 100.4 Fahrenheit will be allowed to return 72 hours after a fever has broken, or with a note from their healthcare provider, or with a documented negative COVID-19 test. https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html
- 4. School Custodian will work with staff to determine spaces in the building that may have been directly impacted by the student, staff or visitor and immediately disinfect those areas.
- 5. There will be no COVID-19 testing of students at school. Local testing site information will be shared with families. The schools' nursing offices will monitor resting results of students once made available by parents/guardians, complying with relevant health and privacy laws.

EHPS COVID-19 RESPONSE FOR SYMPTOMATIC STUDENT PROTOCOLS Communication Protocol:

Following notification of a symptomatic student of COVID-19, EHPS will engage the following protocol to communicate with district leadership, local authorities, faculty and communities. Please note that this protocol may be adjusted as needed to meet contextual and situation implications of each situation.

- 1. The School Nurse will place the student in an isolation room, and contact the parent/guardian for that student to get picked up.
- 2. The School Nurse will notify the Building Principal.
- 3. The School Nurse will notify the EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison.
- 4. Following guidance provided by the CDC and DPH, the parent/guardian will be instructed to keep the student home for 10 days after the onset of the symptoms. This information will be communicated verbally as well as through a letter for the parent/guardian with information regarding how long the student must remain out of school, indications of when the student can return to school, potential testing sites and the academic requirements for that student while they are home. (Template Communication Below)
- 5. The School Nurse will instruct the parent/guardian to contact their health care provider for further instructions.
- 6. The School Nurse will document the date of symptom onset and the date the student may return to school.
- 7. The School Nurse will check in on symptomatic students by day 5 of quarantine with a special focus on status of symptoms, access to doctor and COVID testing status.
- 8. If the parent/guardian notifies the building with a positive COVID-19 test, the School Nurse will put into place the EHPS RESPONSE TO A CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASE IN A SCHOOL PROTOCOL.

EHPS COVID-19 RESPONSE FOR SYMPTOMATIC STUDENTS

Protocols for Academic Learning/Return to School for Quarantined Students (Sent Home with COVID-19 like Symptoms)

This protocol outlines the procedures all staff are expected to follow, should a school have one or more students who begin school as "inperson" learners but may have to be out of school for a period of time because they have been sent home/quarantined for displaying COVID-19 like symptoms. Because the absence is expected to be temporary and these children are expected to return to in-person instruction at their home school, they <u>will not</u> transition to the EHPS Remote Learning Experience (RLE) Program. Rather, the following Academic Learning and Return to School Procedures should be followed for these students.

Academic Procedures:

- 1. The school nurse will notify the school counselor if a child is sent home for displaying COVID-19 like symptoms. The assistant principal or school secretary who receives notification of a child's requirement to quarantine will notify the school nurse and the student's school counselor.
- 2. The school nurse will follow the protocols related to documenting and reporting the information to the District Health and Safety Compliance Liaison (Shelley Farrar) and to the school principal.
- 3. The school counselor will reach out to the family to make sure that the child has reliable access to Wi-Fi, that he/she is able to complete assignments at this time (level of illness- if applicable). The school counselor will also make sure that the student knows how to access his/her assignments using the Google Classroom platform.
- 4. Once the contact has been made, the school counselor will share information in a confidential manner (student will be absent for a period of 10-14 days) with the student's teachers.
- 5. In alignment with the expectations for SY 2020-2021, teachers will continue to post and collect assignments/tasks/assessments every day using the 'Classwork' feature of Google Classroom.
- 6. At two times during the 10-14-day period, each teacher will communicate with the student and his/her parents via phone call, virtual meeting, or email until the child returns to school.
- 7. The school counselor will maintain communication with the child's teachers to ensure that the student is completing assignments with appropriate accommodations. If necessary, the school counselor will talk with the principal or assistant principal to set up an intervention and/or supports for the student.

Return to School Procedures:

- Students may return to school after 10 calendar days from when symptoms began, and their symptoms have improved, if they are free of fever for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication.
- Students may return to school sooner than 10 calendar days if they have been to their health care provider and have documentation of an alternate diagnosis.
- Students may return to school sooner than 10 calendar days if they receive a negative COVID-19 test result.
- If a student tests positive for COVID-19**, They must remain out of school for 10 calendar days, be free of fever for 24 hours without the use of medication, and show improved symptoms.

** Note: If a testing results in the diagnosis of a confirmed case of COVID-19 for a child within a particular school, the Superintendent and the District Health and Compliance Liaison will contact the East Hartford Health Department. With guidance from the Health Department it will be determined if school will need to be shut down for a period of time or if students can remain in school. If school is shut down for a period of 2-5 days, proper cleaning and further evaluation will be done by the Health Department and EHPS. (See <u>EHPS RESPONSE TO A</u> <u>CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASE IN A SCHOOL PROTOCOL</u>)

Dear Parent/Guardian:

We are sending your child home today with COVID-19 like symptoms. Your child will have to be out of school for a period of time. Here are the procedures needed to have your child return to school:

- Students may return to school after 10 calendar days from when symptoms began, and their symptoms have improved, if they are free of fever for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication.
- Students may return to school sooner than 10 calendar days if they have been to their health care provider and have documentation of an alternate diagnosis.
- Students may return to school sooner than 10 calendar days if they receive a negative COVID-19 test result.
- If a student receives a positive COVID-19 test result please contact your school.

Since the absence should be temporary and the child is expected to return to in school learning, they will not need to transition to the EHPS Remote Learning Experience (RLE) program. Instead the school will need to make sure the student can access Wifi and he/she can complete assignments at this time (level of illness). The teacher will continue to post and collect assignments/tasks/assessments every day using the 'classwork' feature of Google Classroom.

Here are some testing sites that you can bring your child to if testing will be done:

Mandamos a su hijo a casa hoy con síntomas similares a COVID-19. Su hijo tendrá que estar fuera de la escuela por un período de tiempo. Estos son los procedimientos necesarios para que su hijo regrese a la escuela:

- Los estudiantes pueden regresar a la escuela después de 10 días calendario desde el momento en que comenzaron los síntomas, y sus síntomas han mejorado, si están libres de fiebre durante 24 horas sin el uso de medicamentos para reducir la fiebre.
- Los estudiantes pueden regresar a la escuela antes de 10 días calendario si han visitado a su proveedor de atención médica y tienen documentación de un diagnóstico alternativo.
- Los estudiantes pueden regresar a la escuela antes de 10 días calendario si reciben un resultado negativo en una prueba COVID-19.
- Si un estudiante recibe un resultado positivo en una prueba COVID-19, por favor comuníquese con su escuela.

EHPS RESPONSE TO A CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASE IN A SCHOOL PROTOCOL

- If a student, staff member, volunteer, or visitor who has been present in school with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19, or was present in school within 48 hours of first exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms leading to a positive diagnosis, the School Nurse and the Building Principal will contact the Superintendent of Schools and the EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison. This communication should be made while maintaining confidentiality in accordance with FERPA, privacy expectations.
- 2. EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison shall notify the East Hartford Department of Public Health (EHDPH) immediately to assess the risk of further transmission in the school.
- 3. Decisions will be made concerning:
 - a. CONTACT TRACING
 - b. CLOSURE, CLEANING
 - c. CONTINUITY OF EDUCATION and/or REOPENING OF SCHOOL
- 4. The decision to suspend or close a school (or the entire school district) will be made by the Superintendent or designee based on information and recommendation from the EHDPH as well as the State Department of Education.
- 5. In the case of a confirmed case of COVID-19 at a particular school, it is likely that the district will implement a short-term closure (2-5 days) or longer, regardless of community spread as recommended by the CDC. This initial short-term dismissal allows time for the district to work with EHDPH to gain a better understanding of the COVID-19 situation impacting the school and develop a response plan. In addition, this time allows for the district to evaluate to determine appropriate next steps, including whether an extended dismissal duration is needed to stop or slow further spread of COVID-19.
- 6. During closure, the school will be deep-cleaned and fully disinfected in preparation for return to school.
- 7. In the case of a confirmed case of COVID-19 at a particular school, EHPS will notify school staff and parents regarding status of the illness while maintaining confidentiality in accordance with FERPA and privacy expectations (Communication Protocol Below).

EHPS RESPONSE TO A CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASE IN A SCHOOL PROTOCOL: Communication Protocol:

Following notification of a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19, EHPS will engage the following protocol to communicate with district leadership, local authorities, faculty and communities. Please note that this protocol may be adjusted as needed to meet contextual and situation implications of each situation.

- 1. The School Nurse and the Building Principal will contact the Superintendent of Schools and the EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison.
- 2. The EHPS District Level COVID-19 Health and Safety Compliance Liaison will notify the East Hartford Department of Public Health (EHDPH) and immediately assess the scale and risk of transmission.
- Following guidance provided by the EHDPH, EHPS will notify school staff and parents regarding stat us of the confirmed diagnosis while maintaining confidentiality of the individual in accordance with FERPA and privacy expectations. (Template Communication Below)
- 4. EHDPH and EHPS Nursing Staff will work collaboratively to engage known contacts via contact tracing. To protect the confidentiality of the individual, school staff and parents are encouraged to contact the School Nurse with questions or concerns.
- 5. During short term closure, EHPS will continue to provide communication to school staff and parents regarding closure, cleaning and ReOpening. Following a school closure, students and staff will transition from the in-person to an online academic environment using the following two platforms: Google Classroom and Google Meet.
- 6. If long-term closure is determined as the necessary next step, EHPS will communicate with faculty and parents regarding the transitional plan.

Dear SCHOOL NAME Faculty and Community Member,

I am writing to you today to inform you that a member of our school community has tested positive for COVID-19. As soon as the district was made aware of this confirmed diagnosis, EHPS notified the East Hartford Department of Public Health (EHDPH) to assess the risk of transmission within the school and the entire district. Based on the guidance provided by the EHDPH, the district will be taking the following steps to keep our community safe.

- Contact Tracing: Working collaboratively, the EHPS Nursing Staff and EHDPH will be engaging in reaching out to all identified contacts of the individual who tested positive. Recognizing the potentially comprehensive nature of this activity and operating within the statutory requirements around the confidentiality of the individual, please feel free to contact your child's nurse for specific questions or concerns.
- 2) Closure/Deep Cleaning: <u>At this point the district has made the decision to close SCHOOL NAME</u> for 2 days. During this period, the Facilities staff will engage in deep cleaning/disinfecting the entire school with a special emphasis on areas that the individual testing positive is known to have accessed. If additional time is needed for contact tracing, or cleaning, EHPS will extend the closure basis on a daily/multi-day basis.
- 3) Continuity of Education/ReOpening School: Based on the assessment of community transmission, EHPS will make a decision within the 2-5-day period to either ReOpen Schools or move to a longer duration of closure. If long-term closure is selected, all students and staff will operationally move to participate in Distance Learning. While this transition may necessitate several operational steps, including the re-entry of students into the building to collect personal belongings, electronic devices or instructional materials, this will be done as quickly as possible to avoid interruption to student instruction.

We recognize the concern and fear that an announcement like this will create for you, your family and our community. In light of this recognition, we are eager to assist you in multiple ways. Please reach out to our school administration or support staff. For district employees, we also encourage you to fully utilize our Employee Assistance Program.

Thank you, as always, for your support and partnership as we work to keep our kids, faculty and community safe.

Si se selecciona el cierre a largo plazo, todos los estudiantes y el personal se trasladarán operacionalmente para participar en el Aprendizaje a Distancia. Si bien esta transición puede requerir varios pasos operativos, incluyendo el reingreso de los estudiantes en el edificio para recoger objetos personales, dispositivos electrónicos o materiales de instrucción, esto se hará lo más rápido posible para evitar la interrupción de la instrucción de los estudiantes.

EHPS COVID-19 DELIVERY MODEL SELECTION PROTOCOL

East Hartford Public Schools will reopen its school while monitoring the level of transmission of COVID-19 with the assistance of the State of Connecticut, the Town and the Department of Public Health. Ideally, the town of East Hartford will remain in the "green" level with little or no community transmission. School schedules and/or protocols may be adjusted, should the community enter a "yellow" level with minimal or moderate community transmission. If there is a substantial surge in local cases, the district or one or more schools will implement a Distance Learning Plan (DLP) model similar to that of the spring of 2020, based on guidance from the State of Connecticut and/or the Department of Public Health.
